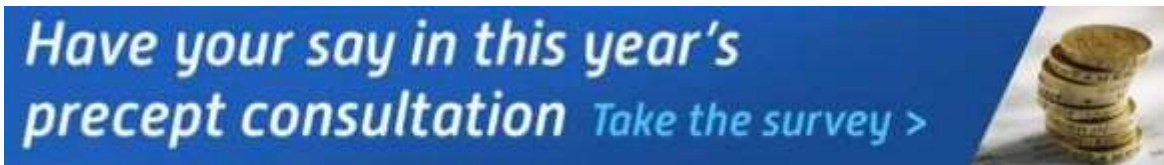

This message is being sent by Sussex Neighbourhood Watch to all residents in Sussex. Please forward it to your friends and relatives.

Earlier today we invited you to take part in the PCC's precept consultation. Unfortunately there was a technical error which meant that some people were unable to see the blue banner which you can click on to complete the survey. This error has now been fixed, and we are re-sending this message. Hopefully you can now all see the blue banner below! If you have already used the "Reply" button to respond may we please ask you to click on the blue banner below and respond again? We offer our sincere apologies for any inconvenience caused.

Neighbourhood Watch colleagues, residents, their families and friends can now take part in the Sussex Police & Crime Commissioner's consultation for the 2017/18 Police Precept. This proposes to increase the police element of council tax by around £5.00 per household to fund over 100 more police officers and specialist staff. We have now received clarification from the Office of the PCC that the £5 is based on an average cost per household, per annum, based on a Council Tax Band D household, so depending on the household size and council tax band it could be more or less.
