Steyning Locomotives

For the many people interested in the Steyning railway, Mrs Jessica Lloyd, a volunteer from the Isle of Wight Steam Railway (and former resident of Upper Beeding and Steyning) has given the Museum pictures and documents relating to the re-launch of the restored steam locomotive, the Ivatt 41313 which drew the last steam train into Steyning Railway station before the line was closed. The locomotive was restored in Somerset on contract to the Isle of Wight Steam Railway and is now permanently at the Isle of Wight Steam Railway. Its sister locomotive, the Ivatt 41312, which also ran on the Steyning Line, has also been restored and is now at the Watercress Line. If anyone is interested, we have information in the Museum about a May Bank Holiday weekend event at the Isle of Wight Steam Railway when the Ivatt 41313 will be running.

Annual General Meeting

The Annual General Meeting of the Museum was held on Saturday 24th March. Following the retirement last year of Chris Tod as Curator, the Museum has been organised over the year by small teams, and Muriel Wright's annual report as chairman included information gathered from them.

At this time last year, the committee had hoped by now to have handed over administration to the new CIO(charitable incorporated organisation.) Various practical problems had been thrown up to

delay the change over, but things were now proceeding well.

Muriel in her report highlighted several points:

A major point of concern in the past year has been the legal status of items loaned to the Museum.

The problem of space for storage had increased.

A start had been made to transfer the Museum catalogue to the "Modes" computer system. It is a lengthy job, but once complete it will enable items to be rapidly located.

Visits from local schools had continued to be made together with those from Continental ones.

The Museum joined the Library for the summer reading event, the children's activity days continued, and a new development was a "soldier quiz".

Andrew Woodfield and his team continued to mount exhibitions of a high standard.

A new team has taken over the creation of the stewards rota as Sarah Leigh steps down from the task after many years. The chairman offered special thanks for Sarah's commitment and hard work over the years. She was presented with a gift of flowers in thanks.

The treasurer's report highlighted the very healthy financial position of the Museum. Of special interest was the way that the roof panels has been covering our electricity consumption.

Elections

All the existing officers and helpers were re-elected.

The CIO AGM

Though matters had not yet progressed to the point where the CIO could take over, its first AGM was held. The only item of business was the election of the

five trustees. Only five were needed and they would be responsible for choosing the committee members.

The five trustees elected by the meeting were: Helen Coutrouzas, Paul Norris, Sarah Leigh, Chris Tod and Muriel Wright.

200 Club

Paul Norris reported on the 200 Club. He was pleased to report that through Erica Gayler's hard work, the membership stood at about 190. This was good news as it had been feared that as over the past year the membership had dropped to the point where the prize monies would have had to be reduced.

The Speaker

Following the meeting, the speaker was Andrew Woodfield who gave us an amusing talk starting with his Yorkshire childhood and his later involvement with theatre performance and about a career with Brighton Toy Museum and now Steyning Museum.
